ACLU OF HAWAI'I CAMPAIGNS

• DECRIMINALIZING POVERTY

- End the use of houseless “sweeps”
- Eliminate cash bail in favor of alternatives that do not lock folks up for lack of resources
- Decriminalize low-level and quality of life offenses.

• REIMAGINING POLICING

- Educate the public about policing in Hawai'i and why it needs to change.
- Redirect funding to non-law enforcement solutions.
- Increase police accountability and curb police abuse of power
- Build a coalition of individuals, organizations, and directly impacted people.
- Create state cause of action against police for constitutional violations.

• SMART JUSTICE

- Achieve categorical use of the Governor's clemency power in order to release:
 - people who would serve a lesser sentence, if convicted under current laws;
 - people convicted of drug distribution/possession offenses, regardless of underlying substance;
 - people incarcerated for technical probation or parole violations;
 - kupuna
- Create pathways and expand access to real, meaningful, successful, reentry support

2022 Legislative Victories

- Reentry – Diversion funding, Limited IDs, Restorative Justice Reentry Planning Circles, Minimum Release date, etc.
- SB206 Relating to Rentals - Housing Discrimination Source of Income
- SB 2115 - Room Confinement for Youth
- **Other:** Department of Hawaiian Homelands \$600 million in funding, menstrual equity bill, LGTBQ+ Commission, and defeated bad bills



Legislative Priorities 2023

POLICING DATA COLLECTION

Police departments in all counties will be required to submit an annual report to the State Legislature and to each police departments' website. Data collected will include: traffic and pedestrian stops, arrests, use of force, misconduct, demographic information and other data points. Comprehensive and uniform data is integral towards advancing effective, transparent and accountable policing responsive to communities served.

PRETRIAL FAIRNESS

The proposed measure creates a presumption that a person charged with a crime will be released without conditions unless the State proves by clear and convincing evidence that detention is necessary to prevent flight from jurisdiction, specific danger to other individuals and/or obstruction of justice.

CLEAN SLATE

This measure will expand eligibility for expungement beyond arrests and limited number of offenses. It would require the State to create a system that automates record clearance and requires automatic clearance upon eligibility of the record. This would also include arrest records, misdemeanor records, and eligibility of limited felony records.

COALITION OF ORGANIZATIONS RELEASE STATEMENT AFFIRMING NEED FOR CASH BAIL REFORMS

HONOLULU – The call for Governor Ige's veto of HB 1567, a modest bail reform bill that passed the legislature last month, by the four county mayors, Prosecuting Attorney Alm and opponents of bail reform is based on misinformation and false claims about cash bail. In response to the misinformation, Faith Action for Community Equity in coalition with 30 organizations across the State, including Hawai'i Health & Harm Reduction Center, Community Alliance on Prisons, ACLU of Hawai'i, Papa Ola Lōkahi, League of Women Voters, Americans for Democratic Action, Maui Economic Opportunity, Going Home Hawai'i and others, have released a joint statement that clarifies the facts about the bail system, bail reform, and its impact on public safety.

"We came together as a coalition to counter the dissemination of misinformation and harmful narratives about cash bail and the people it impacts," said Lee Curran, Vice President of Laity at Faith Action. "We are committed to transformative justice for the long term, including bail reform and putting community supports and accountability in place to best facilitate the safety and well being of all members of our communities."

"Many public officials and opponents calling for a veto had months to engage in the legislative process, yet failed to do so," said Carrie Ann Shirota, Policy Director at the ACLU of Hawai'i. "More puzzling is that representatives from the Police, Prosecutors, and Attorney General's office participated in the [Hawai'i Criminal Pretrial Task Force](#) and jointly recommended expanding alternatives to pretrial detention and eliminating the use of money bail for low-level offenses, yet now they oppose this modest measure to challenge an unequal pretrial system." Shirota also noted an [analysis of HB1567](#) released by ACLU Hawai'i that highlights the minimal impact of the bill on pretrial populations due to the long list of exemptions.

"Investing time and resources into proven community-based solutions is what will keep our communities safe," said Kylie Akiona, a co-facilitator of Faith Action's Transformative Justice Taskforce. Serhenetee Tonumaipea, a member of the Faith Action Taskforce who also participates in the Bail Reform Project at University of Hawai'i at Mānoa echoed this sentiment, adding, "The broad support for this coalition statement speaks to the change we all agree is needed in the cash bail system."



WHY BAIL REFORM?

Approximately 1,000 community members are currently locked up in Hawai'i's overcrowded jails despite being legally innocent.

ROAD TO RESTORATION

Do you have a driver license or car registration "stopper"? You may be able to clear it!

Traffic "stoppers" or administrative holds on a driver's license or car registration after a person is unable to pay a traffic or parking ticket. Act 59 ended this harmful and counterproductive practice but too many people don't know how to clear their record.


