Those who cannot afford their ticket and therefore cannot renew their license may be forced to

choose between driving without a valid license (a traffic crime punishable by up to a \$1,000 fine or up to one year in jail) and losing their job or taking their child to the doctor. In recent years, several jurisdictions have either moved away from or completely stopped suspending licenses for nonpayment of traffic and parking

tickets. In Hawai'i, there are approximately 350,000 outstanding license and registration stoppers.
